This year's varsity football team compiled an overall 7-2 win-loss record, but unfortunately, both losses came at the hands of league opponents, which eliminated hopes for a CIF play-off berth.

The team's backfield, which averaged 23.8 points per game, was led by halfback Mike Palmer, fullback Art Henderson, flanker Jim Menges, and quarterback Derry Smith.

In the opening game against Buena, the Vikings pulled out a last-minute victory, 20-19. Pat Wilson paved the way, by scoring a 55-yard run in the first quarter. Art Henderson, hero of the moment, scored the winning touchdown with 1:04 left to play in the game.

The second non-league game was highlighted by Mike Palmer's four touchdowns as he led the Vikings to 38-0 victory over Crescenta Valley. This win was beset, however, by the injuries of Henderson, and starting center Bob Skrala.

In the league opener against Hawthorne, Viking gridders fought their way to a 14-7 victory. Palmer scored a 65-yard run in the first quarter, only to have it tied up by Hawthorne. Late in the fourth quarter, Derry Smith hit big tight end Mark Nuffer on a pass good for 48 yards and a touchdown to sew up the game.

Viking hopes for an undefeated league season were dampened when Redondo upset the Vikings 7-0 in the second league game. Samohi only threatened once when they reached the Seahawk three-yard line, but a penalty and then a fumble erased all scoring hopes.

After their disappointing loss to Redondo, Head Coach Dick Turner's gridders fired up to sweep past North Torrance 34-14. Defensive end Giberson picked up a Saxon fumble in the first quarter and ran 18 yards to put Samohi on the Scoreboard. Palmer scored twice, giving him the lead in Bay Area scoring with 42 points. The final scores came on a 1-yard quarterback sneak by Smith to Nuffer.

The Viking football machine then roared over winless South

Torrance 33-6 in a game badly marred by fog. Smith utilized an aerial attack, making good use of ends Nufer and Casillas and flanker Jim Menges, each of whom scored one touchdown, with Pat Wilson and Art Henderson scoring on the ground for the Vikes.

Viking gridders then swept past Inglewood 35-7 in the homecoming game at Corsair Field. Fullback Henderson scored first on a 60-yard run. Defensive back Meadows intercepted two Sentinel passes to set up two more touchdowns by Palmer. A blocked punt by Daryl Lev set up the final touchdown by Palmer. Junior kicker Andre de la Cerdia kicked all five of the extra points, his best effort of the season.

In the sixth league game, Samohi downed Mira Costa 33-7 to remain in Bay League second place. Mike Palmer displayed his best efforts of the season as he rushed for 365 yards in 21 carries, the second greatest rushing performance in CIF history. Palmer scored four times; the fifth touchdown came on an 11-yard run by fullback Henderson.

In the final game of the season, the Viking gridders were edged out of the Bay League co-championship and a CIF playoff berth by West Torrance, 13-7. West scored early on a 73-yard drive, then turning the game into a battle of defenses until the fourth quarter, when a 25-yard gain by Palmer and a key pass to end Greg Casillas put Samohi on the West six-yard line, where quarterback Smith took it around end for the score. Samohi's ensuing onside kickoff attempt failed, as West took over near the 50-yard line. Hall led them to the Samohi 27-yard line, where Warrior halfback Dean Owens swept left for the final score.

At the annual Fall Sports Banquet, Palmer was honored as Most Valuable Player, while Jack O'Brien was chosen captain, and Most Valuable Lineman. Jim Menges was picked as Most Valuable Back, while Pat Laverth was selected as Most Improved. Bill Hunt was chosen as Most Consistent, and Pat Wilson was elected Most Inspirational. Besides these awards, six Vikes were chosen to the All-Bay League team: halfback Palmer, tackle Bill Hunt, tight end Mark Nufer, linebacker Jack O'Brien, defensive back Jim Menges, and middle guard Ardy Berry. Defensive end Pat Laverth and fullback Art Henderson were awarded honorable mention.





Samohi's 1968 varsity water polo team, coached by Mr. Frank Brooks, finished second in Bay League with a 6-2 record, their only losses coming at the hands of powerful Mira Costa. The team was led by high-scoring junior forward Brad Jackson, and seniors Jim Makuta, and Dave Mullin. Backing them up were seniors Alan Bartlett, Bob Bell, Tom Follette, junior Steve Brown, and sophomore Robert Webb. Senior Ken Myers held his own in the Vike goal.

After experiencing a rough pre-season against top teams, in which they were winless, the team began to work as a unit. They defeated their first two league opponents, Redondo and Hawthorne. The highlight of the season came when the Vikes met Mira Costa, defending league champions, and fifth in CIF last year. After a hard-fought battle, Samohi ended up one short on the scoreboard, 7-6, but it was the best effort of the team this year.



Particularly successful were the sophomore distancemen who managed to secure second place league standing, the best standing ever secured by a Viking sophomore squad.



{below} Tim Barry





Tom Murray, returning League Champion, applies a pin hold on his Mira Costa opponent.















Viking varsity trackmen romped to a 78-40 win over the hapless Sentinels capturing three man sweeps in the 100, 220, 440, and long jump events. In the 100, fleetfoot Chris Cole blazed to a 10.0 seconds flat while in the 220 teammate Dave Lawton edged out Cole to win that event.

The track team continued its winning streak against Redondo, Mira Costa, South and in the Inglewood and Mt. Sac Invitational, to place highly in Bay League standings.







Jack O'Brien started at the catcher's spot while Frank Meadows, Pat Wilson, and Jim Smith comprised the outfield.









In addition to the volleyball playday, many of the GAA members from the team entered in junior tournaments throughout Southern California during the spring semester.


The team held practice every Wednesday after school with the girls working together to develop their own abilities and at the same time combining talents in teamwork.
